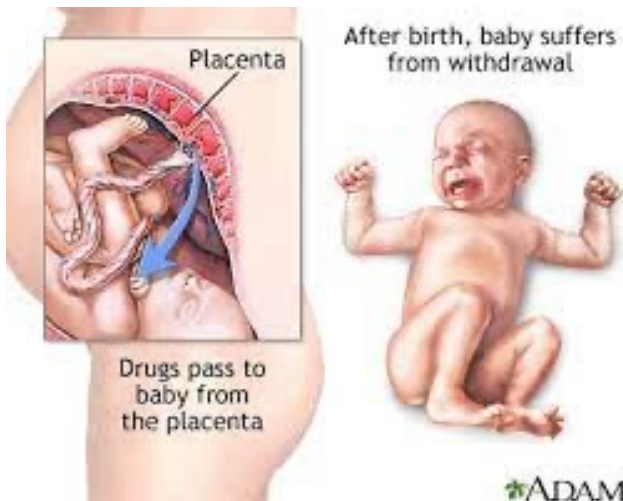

Screening, Intervention & Referral of Pregnant Women

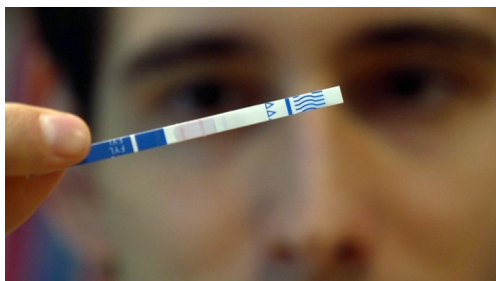
Treating pregnant women with addiction improves the health of mothers, children, and families.



Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome Treatment

Opioid use during pregnancy creates dependence in the unborn child. Treatment reduces long-term impacts.



Fentanyl Testing & Tracing

Some individuals in the criminal justice system are required to take drug tests. Screening specifically for Fentanyl and rewarding tips to suppliers will reduce Fentanyl prevalence.



Naloxone Leave-Behind

Leaving Naloxone opioid overdose antidote nasal spray behind when emergency services are called to an overdose saves lives because many who overdose will overdose again, and many overdoses happen with a bystander.



Hospital Counseling / Bridge Treatment Clinic

Immediate referral within hospitals will address addiction among hospital care consumers, who suffer from a higher rate of addiction and illness comorbidity.



Incarcerated / Pre-trial Treatment

Addiction rates are high and health indicators low among those involved with the criminal justice system. Offering treatment will improve health, reduce rates of recidivism and discourage involvement in drug trafficking.
